I'm looking to network the vacant farmlands throughout Canada in preparation for full legalisation in 2018.

Much of the farmland is untouched, or else populated by an ageing metric at risk of losing their homes, due to their ageing status coupled with the cost of maintenance for acreages.

We're seeking investment to make these pot farms entirely sustainable, combining diverse crops, intelligent agricultural practices, and renewable tech to present a new market opportunity for investors to literally pay off their debt through their investment via government subsidies, all while securely expanding their portfolios into the burgeoning sustainability sector, through one tidy package.

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We will also be crowdfunding support in order to keep equal representation of interests. We will be surveying farm workers, the WOOF and tree-planting community, freemen and sovereigns, and the First Nations Reservations Coalition in order to discern and better target needs.

Through this networking we hope to gain insight into metrics, demographics, interests, and shared aims, so as to be able to effectively steer toward unified goals for all communities.

We will provide residencies for workers and a stipend upon leave.

The farms themselves will include adult classrooms with a Montessori-style ethos, allowing for purposeful play through the providence of intellectual discourse, training and education in subject-relevant areas, art spaces, and social exchange.

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Now, I've seen a lot of models for these kinds of projects the world over and through my research hope to be able to pick the best attributes from the bunch in order to craft a fully-functional, multi-faceted platform that meets all aims cohesively.

Social innovation is constantly evolving. At a certain stage we need to take things meta.

Social enterprise isn't nearly as effective as it should be, as up until this point in history, we've only ever modelled our approach on how corporate business has put forth.

We're essentially fighting fire with fire.

Social enterprise needs its own system of thought in order to embody its full potential to tip the scales away from outdated corporate interests and toward ideal futurist notions.

Our aim is to still incorporate the component structures of business; traditional departments encompassed by the first layer of enterprise operations; and then progressing the system toward further upward expansion in the sense of pioneering new higher level departments.

These departments would fulfil the current government needs for representation in the areas of sustainability, social reform and restorative programmes, philosophic inquiry outside of academia, and creative spaces for citizens to share resources through creating art.

Again, many such structures presently exist, however they are gridlocked into vying for the limited resources made available to them, thus defeating their own intended purpose.
